Revival is a spiritual reawakening that occurs when a believer emerges from a state of dormancy or stagnation, renewed in their love for God, appreciation for His holiness, and passion for His Word and church. It is characterized by a convicting awareness of personal and corporate sin, humility, and a desire for repentance and growth in righteousness. Revival invigorates the believer's faith, opening their eyes to truth in a fresh way, often marked by a new beginning with a clean slate. It breaks the world's charm and power, enabling believers to live in obedience to God rather than of the world. In the USA, the First Great Awakening in the 1730s and 1740s was a significant revival that produced an upsurge of devotion among Protestants. Revival replicates the believer's experience when they are saved, initiated by the Holy Spirit's prompting, which creates awareness of something missing or wrong. The Christian must respond from the heart, acknowledging their need, and then the Holy Spirit draws back the veil, allowing believers to fully see themselves in comparison to God's majesty and holiness. Revival represents a restoration of fellowship with God, even when the believer had pulled away for a time. It helps restore the first love and passion for Christ, particularly during times of emotional, physical, or spiritual exhaustion. Revival also assists in rightly discerning values, examining messages, and finding the truth, as well as resuscitating spiritual life. The evidence of revival is changed lives, marked by great movements toward righteousness, evangelism, social justice, prayer, reading, and obedience to God's Word. It is often characterized by confession of sin and repentance. Revival: A Return to God's Word and Normal Christian Life A revival service may come in various styles, but essential to it is preaching, as seen in Nehemiah 8-9. The central element was Ezra's reading of the law before the congregation, where both the preacher and the audience played a crucial role in understanding and applying God's word. Preaching involves bringing the Bible to the pulpit and explaining its meaning to the people. The congregation must give reverence to the reading by being attentive and listening. In Romans 10, it is emphasized that without a preacher, there can be no converts or renewed Christians. Revival depends on effective preaching. Worship was another vital part of the revival service in Nehemiah 8-9. Ezra blessed the Lord, and the people responded with lifting up their hands and bowing down to worship Him. Worship happens when we return to the realization of Who God is and what He expects from His people. It inspires our hearts to return to the Christian life. Repentance, rejoicing, and a renewed commitment to doing right are also essential elements of any revival service. Repentance involves turning away from sin and returning to God; rejoicing happens when we reencounter Who God is and all that He has done for us; and a renewed commitment to doing right enables us to live out our faith in practical ways. Revival is essential for God's people when they need to be forgiven and restored to life, spiritual health, and vitality, to deal with the sin in his life and so will we! We need Him if our land is going to be healed. In 2 Chronicles 7:14, God says that if His people are repentant, then He will "heal their land." Our land is suffering. Secularists are forecasting the loss of U.S. economic and military influence around the world. Earthquakes, hurricanes, tornadoes, droughts, floods, . . . from natural disasters to national debt, it seems clear our nation is in trouble. Not only has infertility doubled in the U.S. since 1992, the World Health Organization believes the infertility will be the third most serious disease of the twenty-first century, following cancer and cardiovascular disorders. Is God getting our attention? This was similar to what the people of Israel were experiencing in the days of Haggai the prophet: "You have sown much, and bring in little; you eat, but do not have enough; you drink, but you are not filled with drink; you clothe yourselves, but no one is warm; and he who earns wages, earns wages to put into a bag with holes." (Haggai 1:6) We need Him if we are going to love the world the way He does. In Luke 9:36-38, Jesus has compassion on the masses of people without God. He feels something that is visceral, engaging all the emotions in a way that is hard to explain. They are not looking to churches for those answers, as much as they are running away from the institutional church. We need Him if we are going to see more people giving their lives to Christ, trusting Him for salvation. In the presence of God, lives are changed and resistance to the gospel melts away. However, today we are seeing the fewest number of people coming to Christ since the 1950s. In 2010, Southern Baptists baptized 332,321, the lowest number in sixty years. Baptisms in Southern Baptist churches have been in decline for over a decade. We need Him if we are going to impact our nation for Christ. During the First Great Awakening, 20 percent of the colonial population came to Christ and joined churches. Today, less than 20 percent regularly attend church. Discussed at length in his book *The American Church in Crisis* (Zondervan, 2009), David Olson conducted research showing that only 17.5 percent of the population attends church on any given weekend in America. In their book *Comeback Churches* (B&H Publishing, 2007), Mike Dodson and Ed Stetzer explain that less than 5 percent of churches are experiencing significant conversion growth—most churches are simply reshuffling existing members. Although Southern Baptists boast having more than 16 million members, only one-third will attend church this coming Sunday. One observer concluded that the church has become nothing more than a symbolic place for "hatching, matching, and dispatching" (i.e., baby dedications, weddings, and funerals). Everything changes when God comes among us! Let us pray that He will revive each of our hearts with Himself, transforming our nation as we are transformed as His people.
