Fce exam use of english exercises

The Cambridge B2 First exam has undergone changes since 2015, and the following quizzes and exercises are designed to help you prepare for the new format. The Use of English paper is divided into four parts: Multiple Choice Cloze, Open Cloze, Word Formation, and Key Word Transformations. Multiple Choice Cloze is a test of your vocabulary knowledge, where you choose the correct word from four similar options to complete sentences or phrases. The section guides provide detailed explanations for each part of the exam. The Open Cloze section requires you to fill in one word to complete short texts, usually focusing on grammatical words such as pronouns and prepositions. Practice exercises are available online to help you prepare. Word Formation involves using a root word like "able" to create an appropriate word, while Key Word Transformations require you to use a key word to complete a second sentence so that it means the same as the first sentence. The Reading Comprehension sections test your ability to understand coherence and cohesion in texts. The Gapped Text section requires you to put back missing paragraphs from a text, focusing on understanding the global meaning of the text. Practice exercises for each section are available online, along with detailed marking and feedback to help you improve. Multiple Matching is the final part of the B2 First Reading and Use of English paper, where you match questions or prompts to parts of a single text or individual smaller texts that follow. This assesses your ability to understand specific detail and author attitude and opinion. See our guide for more information on this section. The writing paper consists of two parts. For Part One, choose one out of three questions to complete. The total time available is one hour and twenty minutes. You may need to write an essay, email, article, report, or review. The speaking paper has four parts and takes about 14 minutes to complete. There are eight complete speaking papers with all parts included. Practice exercises for these sections can be found online. The First Certificate in English is an upper intermediate level exam that corresponds to level B2 of the Common European Framework of Reference. It's designed for students who have a satisfactory command of the English language and is recognized by many educational institutions and universities. The exam consists of four papers: Writing, Reading and Use of English, Listening, and Speaking.
