During this time, temperatures are mild, peaking in the 80s and dropping to 60s at night. Visiting in winter is also an option, as it's a great time to experience nature's beauty in cold weather. To get to Joshua Tree, you'll need a car, but most cities have major airports with car rental facilities nearby. From Los Angeles, the drive takes about two hours and forty minutes, while from San Diego, it's three hours long. Las Vegas is only a four-hour drive away. Plan your park visit wisely, taking note of the terrain to maximize your time there. Pack a picnic lunch or snacks as dining options are scarce in the area, be prepared. Be cautious around them as they are spiky and can stick to your clothes and skin easily. Skull Rock is another notable formation, resembling a human skull due to erosion. The Cottonwood Springs nature trail is a popular option, offering an easy 1-mile round trip into the nearby Cottonwood Campground. Barker Dam, a historic reservoir, has a 1.3-mile loop trail that becomes a small water feature during rainy seasons, attracting birds and wildlife. The park is also renowned for its scenic landscapes, featuring Joshua trees, creosote bush, piñon pines, and granite rock formations. For adventure seekers, the Ryan Mountain Trail offers a challenging 3-mile round trip to the summit of Ryan Mountain, providing panoramic views of the entire park.
